Sustainability in the Home Economics classroom – recycling

Recycling is an integral part of Home Economics through resource management and practical application. In December 2017, a newly updated list of recyclable materials was released. Ireland must do more in relation to recycling for a number of reasons:

- 1. It will help the environment and help reduce the amount of rubbish we send to landfill.
- 2. Countries who buy our recyclable materials to use in manufacturing now expect a much higher quality of material for their money.



The key message of the campaign is there are now 3 definite categories of recyclable materials:

- 1. Paper and cardboard 2. Tir
- 2. Tins and cans
- 3. Rigid plastic containers

And they should be CLEAN, DRY and LOOSE in the bin.

EXAM TIP

Junior and Leaving Cert section B, question 1, part A can be the most difficult question for students as technically they cannot study for it – it is a skill they must learn and practise.

In 2011 the chief examiner's report for Leaving Cert Home Economics noted how 'the higher achieving candidates were able to give comprehensive answers', while those that scored poorly had answers that 'lacked structure, detail and analysis, with some parts of the question omitted altogether'. The report stated, 'the structuring of answers is important. Students should answer in point form under relevant headings and should avoid lengthy descriptive paragraphs'.

Therefore, using a table format is the clearest way for students to answer the question and ensure they get full marks.
